Description et objectifs

Religion in the History of the United States

will invite students to think about religion as a historical phenomenon. The focus will be on the relationship between history and religion, and on the role religion played in the development of the United States and American identity.

Several scholars have pointed out that religion was often left out in historical narratives. According to Jill Lepore, "it is a blind spot of our historians" (Newsweek, 09/20/18). Throughout the history of the United States, however, religion has contributed both to forces of diversity and fragmentation, as well as to forces of union and cultural homogeneity. Conversely, throughout history, religion has been subject to new meanings and interpretations.

The seminar is an introduction to the study of religion, spirituality and secularism in the United States. The first semester

Before the rise of social and cultural history during the 1970s and 1980s, most American historians focused on Protestantism and white heterosexual male leaders. Today, in contrast, historians tend to highlight transatlantic connections, religious pluralism, issues of gender, and the agency of Native Americans, enslaved people, and women of all races.





The seminar will be organized both chronologically and thematically. Students will confront historiographical questions.

They will be invited to select, read and present relevant primary and secondary sources.
